Football in Cambodia

Football is without doubt the number one sport in Cambodia. The national team celebrated its greatest triumph in 1972 by reaching the semi-finals of the Asian Cup. Political problems in the country then prevented football from being developed properly. Commendable results achieved in the South East Asian Games in Jakarta in 1997 and at the Tiger Cup in Thailand in 2000 have raised hopes for a brighter future.

The first Goal Project

AFC President and Goal Bureau chairman Mohamed Bin Hammam inaugurated the new association headquarters and training centre in Phnom Penh on 15 January 2003. The complex, containing training pitches, lecture rooms, rooms for overnight stays and administrative quarters, will be the focal point of football in Cambodia. Association President Ravy Khek addressed his guests as follows at the opening ceremony: «The Cambodian association can now cope with its enormous challenges thanks to the new administration and training complex - that is, to develop football into a sport in which teamwork and mutual respect are basic values promoting the good of the game and the well-being of young people in Cambodia.» A new era has dawned in Cambodian football.



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Second Goal project

The revised Football Federation of Cambodia project, which was approved by the Goal Bureau on 4 February 2008, involves the construction of four regional football centres that will each consist of a pitch, an office building, two dressing rooms and a multi-purpose room. The centres will be spread out across the whole country. The centre in Kep City will also have accommodation facilities for up to 50 people.



Women's football

When, in 1995, today's FIFA President said "The future of football is feminine", it was more than mere lip service. It reflected a strong belief in the huge potential that women's football has to develop. Ever since, FIFA has given targeted support for the efforts of associations who offer women the same opportunities to develop as male players. Launched in 1998, FIFA's Financial Assistance Programme (FAP) introduced a requirement in 2004 for the associations and confederations to invest at least 4% of their FAP funding into women's football. This threshold was increased to 10% in 2005. On top of this commitment, FIFA also promotes the women's game in more general ways by directly financing women's matches and organising competitions and symposiums. Thanks to its development programmes, FIFA is also playing an active role in the training of administrators, coaches, referees and sports doctors.
